## O'Leary Co-authors Practice Guidelines for Managing Liver Failure



Jacqueline O'Leary, M.D., a Professor in the Division of Digestive and Liver Diseases, co-authored "Practice Guidance on Acute-on-chronic Liver Failure and the Management of Critically III Patients with Cirrhosis," published in Hepatology by the American Association for the Study of Liver Diseases.

Originally from Pontiac, Michigan, Dr. O'Leary holds a bachelor's degree with honors and distinction in biological sciences from Stanford University in Stanford, California. She earned her medical degree at the University of California-San Francisco. She later completed a master's degree in public health from the Harvard School of Public Health in Boston.

She completed internal medicine residency training at UT Southwestern and then completed advanced training through fellowships in gastroenterology and transplant hepatology at Massachusetts General Hospital in Boston. She conducted postdoctoral research at the Center for Blood Research at Harvard Medical School.

She joined the UT Southwestern faculty in 2017.

## **Beckman Discusses Device Therapy in Peripheral Artery Disease**



**Joshua Beckman, M.D.**, a Professor of Internal Medicine and Director of Vascular Medicine, recently published "Coming of Age for Device Therapy in Peripheral Artery Disease" in *The New England Journal of Medicine*.

"The tools available to endovascular practitioners that are used to treat patients with peripheral artery disease have been evolving rapidly; however, the results of interventions in vessels below the knees in patients with chronic limb-threatening ischemia have room for improvement," he writes. "Recent studies suggest that the field of endovascular intervention for peripheral artery disease is maturing into one

of evidence-based medicine, focusing on both device success and clinical outcomes. As the field moves forward with new treatments, the incorporation of clinical outcomes should be standard."

His topic: "Defining Leptin's Role in the Response to Influenza."

Dr. Rajagopalan earned his medical and doctoral degrees at UT Southwestern, where he studied metabolic fluxes during cell proliferation. He then completed his internal medicine residency training and advanced training in pulmonary and critical care medicine at Columbia University in New York. His post-doctoral work included investigating the role of leptin

signaling during influenza and COVID infection.

Dr. Rajagopalan joined the UT Southwestern faculty in 2023.
