

Abramowitz, Drobycki Co-author Chapter on Postpartum Diabetes





Jessica Abramowitz, M.D., an Associate Professor in the Division of Endocrinology, and Nancy Drobycki, M.S.N., RN, a Certified Diabetes Care and Education Specialist and Coordinator of the Diabetes Management Program, have coauthored "Postpartum Diabetes Management," a chapter in Diabetes Management in Hospitalized Patients: A Comprehensive Clinical Guide, published by Springer Link.

"There is a paucity of literature and guidelines focusing on diabetes care and management in the postpartum period," Dr. Abramowitz says. "We discuss postpartum physiology, glucose monitoring, medication management, insulin

management, lifestyle interventions, lactation, postpartum screening, and care delivery between pregnancies."

Recognized by the American Diabetes Association, UT Southwestern's Diabetes Management Program includes faculty physicians, advance practice nurses, and diabetes educators. In 2023, the program served more than 900 new patients. For patients in the program, the hospital readmission rate within 30 days of discharge was 2.7 percent versus 10 percent for those who did not receive diabetes self-management education.

"Seventeen percent of the population we serve has gestational diabetes or pre-existing diabetes in pregnancy," Dr. Abramowitz says. "But people with diabetes who have had at least one visit for diabetes self-management education at UT Southwestern show an average A1C reduction of 1 percent within three to six months after their initial education visit."

COVE Team Joins with Ambulatory Float Nurses to Administer Vaccines



Members of UT Southwestern's Care of the Vulnerable Elderly (COVE) program team joined the Ambulatory Float nursing team to administer flu vaccinations to 121 homebound patients and COVID vaccinations for more than 80, according to **Namirah Jamshed, M.D.**, an Associate Professor in the Division of Geriatric Medicine, Director of the Geriatric Medicine Fellowship program, and Medical Director of COVE.

"This was a successful effort organized by Daniel Alemayehu, our Director of Primary Care Programs," Dr. Jamshed says.

"He ensured our House Calls patients received their vaccines in a timely way in the comfort of their own homes. Plus, there was high patient satisfaction with this process, which ensured that the vaccine administration met UT Southwestern standards."

Dr. Jamshed holds the Professorship in Geriatric Medicine, in Honor of Vivyenne Roche, M.D.

Khera Discusses Cardio-Kidney-Metabolic Syndrome



Amit Khera, M.D., a Professor in the Division of Cardiology and Director of the Preventive Cardiology Program, described a new condition called cardio-kidney-metabolic syndrome (CMK) in his latest post on UT Southwestern's *MedBlog*.

"For decades, doctors, and scientists have gathered evidence that four cardiometabolic conditions are intertwined: obesity, heart disease, diabetes, and chronic kidney disease. Providers have historically had to approach this web of conditions by separating the sum into its parts – spotting and treating the individual diseases separately, often after damage had been done to the patient's heart and kidneys. This fragmented

approach brought the previously declining U.S. cardiovascular death rate to a halt and let slip through the cracks thousands of heart attacks, strokes, and cases of kidney failure each year – cases that could have been prevented with guardrails to identify and address the four conditions collectively. Fast forward to 2023, and that need is finally being fulfilled."
