

Department to Welcome New Residents in July



The results of the National Resident Matching Program (the Match) were revealed on March 15. Of the more than 748 applicants interviewed by Internal Medicine, those who matched were from 38 different medical schools (including 11 international institutions).

Beginning in July, the Department will welcome new residents in the following programs:

- 54 Internal Medicine
- 10 Neurology
- 6 Preliminary

- 7 Physician-Scientist
- 4 Internal Medicine / Pediatrics
- 2 Internal Medicine / Psychiatry
- 10 Ophthalmology

Li Receives Career Development Award

Dr. William Henrich, Former Professor



William L. Henrich, M.D., President of UT Health San Antonio and a former Professor of Internal Medicine at UT Southwestern, died on March 14, 2024, after a lengthy illness. He was 77.

"Dr. Henrich presided over the greatest period of expansion in UT Health San Antonio's 65-year history, accentuated by \$1 billion in ongoing transformational construction projects that will change the city's health care and biomedical research landscape," according to UT Health.

A board certified nephrologist, Dr. Henrich was the author of the most widely used dialysis textbook in the world, *Henrich's Principles and Practice of Dialysis*. He served as dean of the health science center's Joe R. and Teresa Lozano Long School of Medicine from 2006 until 2009, when The University of Texas System Board of Regents appointed him president.

Dr. Henrich held a bachelor's degree in English from Columbia University. He received his medical degree from Baylor College of Medicine and completed internal medicine residency training at the University of Oregon Medical School, followed by a fellowship in nephrology at the University of Colorado School of Medicine.

Dr. Henrich served as a member of the UT Southwestern faculty from 1978 to 1995.

Ethnic Minorities Face Higher Risk of Liver Transplant Failure



The risk of dying while awaiting a liver transplant or having a transplant fail for patients with alcohol-associated liver diseases is higher among racial and ethnic minorities, according to research published in <u>Transplantation</u>. The findings could lead to targeted interventions that improve outcomes for high-risk groups suffering from alcohol-associated hepatitis and cirrhosis.

"Our study looked at factors within individual patient populations and uncovered predictors of mortality or graft failure," says **Thomas Cotter, M.D.**, an Assistant Professor in the Division of Digestive and Liver Diseases. "Our goal is to

pinpoint areas toward alleviating disparities in liver transplantation outcomes."

Jochen Reiser, M.D., Ph.D., President of the University of Texas Medical Branch (UTMB) in Galveston and CEO of the UTMB Health System, will present the Internal Medicine Grand Rounds lecture on Friday, March 22, at 8 a.m. in D1.502. His topic: "The Path is the Goal: Physician-Science and a Potential New Drug for Kidney Disease."

Originally from Germany, Dr. Reiser received his medical and doctoral degrees from Heidelberg University. He worked as postdoctoral fellow in molecular and cellular biology and kidney disease at Albert Einstein College of Medicine, where he also received internal medicine residency training. He then

obtained advanced training through a nephrology fellowship program at Massachusetts General Hospital and Brigham and Women's Hospital.

Prior to his appointment at UTMB, Dr. Reiser served in various and progressive leadership roles as a faculty member of Harvard Medical School, the University of Miami, and Rush University.


