### AEC 2015

- The next step of economic integration
- ASEAN to be a single market and production base by 2015. ASEAN + 6 + 1
- Goals:
  - elimination of tariffs and duties
  - free movement of professional labor
  - faster customs clearance procedure.
  - greater market access to trading partners
  - attract foreign direct investments to ASEAN

### AEC 2015 (cont)

- ASEAN shall act in accordance to the principles of an open, outward-looking, inclusive and market-driven economy
- ASEAN Member States include Brunei
  Darussalam, Cambodia, Indonesia, Lao PDR,
  Malaysia, Philippines, Singapore, Thailand,
  Myanmar and Viet Nam. +6 (Australia, New
  Zealand, China, India, South Korea and Japan)
- Extension to all of Asia (and beyond: US)
  - Talks currently underway to include US

# Globalization of Medical Care

- Medical Tourism/Consumerism
  - Thailand and India are leading the way
- The AEC would pave the way for the free flow of skilled labour in eight professions comprising <u>doctors</u>, <u>dentists</u>, <u>nurses</u>, engineers, architects, accountants, surveyors and the tourism industry

## Resurgence of Family Medicine at JPS

- Statistics for FM over last 4 years
- Increase in Applications over last 4 years with Interest in Global Health and OB Fellowship
- 22 New Positions per year, 80 total residents
- Over 300 Applications from US Grads / This Year
- All Positions Filled US grads in Match 6 years running
- Average USMLE scores increased: Average Step 2 score for new entering intern class: 240!



### Global Health Program JPS

- Formal Program Initiated in 2008 with recruitment of Faculty to Develop Global Health Track and Fellowship
- 50 hours Tropical Medicine Lectures per year
- IHC: Refugee and travel medicine clinic
- Participation in Global Health conferences
- International Rotations: Israel, Ghana, PNG Uganda, Russia, Thailand, Haiti, (+INMED)



## Immigration and Global Health Education at JPS

- JPS Family Medicine Refugee Health Clinic
  - 10 to 15,000 Refugees resettled / year in DFW
  - -40 to 50 patients a day
  - Staffed by Global Health tract residents
  - -Primary Faculty: Dr Gibson and Dr Hadley
    - Plus Slee, Paik, Kumar et al



## Immigration & Travel Medicine Clinic JPS

- Cases encountered in last few months:
  - Malaria (8 to 10 patients) 3 ICU admits (no deaths)
  - Shistosomiasis (6 cases)
  - Filariasis (Elephantiasis)
  - Amoebic Liver abscess (many cases)
  - CHF from Chagas disease
  - Cutaneous Larva Migrans
  - Persistent diarrhea post travel
  - Helminthic infestations etc.
