To the UT Southwestern Community:

A little less than a year ago, I wrote to you in the wake of senseless violence – a brutal manifestation of the racism and intolerance that has plagued our country since its inception. Sadly, we are once again witnessing acts of hatred, now directed towards our Asian communities and heightened throughout the course of the pandemic.

Although the full motivations of the perpetrator in Atlanta remain unclear, a majority of the victims were women of Asian descent. UT Southwestern strongly condemns these horrific killings. We stand in solidarity with the Asian and Asian American members of our campus community. Further, we view this event as a stark reminder that we have much work to do.

Our institution welcomes all who come here to learn and work, and who turn to us for care. Sustaining inclusiveness is incumbent upon each of us, in all we do. I write today to reaffirm my own commitment to diversity and inclusion on our campus and wherever we advance our mission. I hope you believe, as I do, that UT Southwestern stands on the side of those working to improve the world through affirmation of human dignity, kindness in our interactions with others, and respect for every individual, in every encounter, every day.
