

## **Physician Assistant Program Marks 50th Anniversary**

The <u>Department of Physician Assistant (PA) Studies</u> in the UT Southwestern School of Health Professions is celebrating 50 years since its first accreditation. Launched in 1972 as a bachelor's program with seven students, it was initially accredited in November 1973. Over the years, the program matured into a full department focused on evidence-based medicine, quality improvement, and patient safety that currently confers a master's degree to about 60 graduates each December. In five decades, it has graduated 1,472 students and gained national recognition.

The Department is committed to excellence in PA education and to meeting the health care needs of an increasingly diverse and dynamic patient population. It consistently attracts applicants from backgrounds that are underrepresented in medicine (URiM) and its current student body is 42% URiM.

Under the leadership of Chair <u>Temple Howell-Stampley, M.D., M.B.A., MACP</u>, the Department of PA Studies developed the Primary Care Preceptorship to increase exposure to primary care, with an emphasis on working in medically underserved communities upon graduation, and to meet growing demands. Employment for PAs is expected to grow 27% from 2022-2032, according to U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics projections – a much faster pace than the average for all occupations. <u>Read more</u>.

## **New Faculty Research Forum Recap**

Each year, the New Faculty Research Forum introduces recently appointed Assistant Professors to the UT Southwestern research community by providing them the opportunity to give brief presentations about their research. The forum brings together established investigators and those

who are commencing their research journey to foster interdisciplinary collaborations and cultivate an environment where innovation flourishes.



Joseph L. Goldstein, M.D., Chair and Professor of Molecular Genetics opened this year's event by offering advice on how to become a successful scientist and urging young investigators to have "technical courage." Dr. Goldstein and his scientific partner and fellow Nobel Laureate, Michael S. Brown, M.D., use that term to describe "a confidence and sense of adventure that emerges from sound training in basic or clinical research, the courage to think big and to use new approaches and techniques to solve novel problems."

## **Grant Incentive Programs: FY23 Update**

Between FY20 and FY23, the <u>Special Grant Incentive</u> (SGI) and the <u>Collaborative Research Grant Incentive</u> (CRGI) have collectively granted 352 incentive awards—surpassing \$3.5 million—to faculty who are successful in obtaining federal grants that meet the programs' criteria.

In FY23, a total of 97 SGIs and CRGIs were allocated to 81 faculty members. The Department of Internal Medicine led with 22 incentives, followed by Molecular Biology and Neuroscience (seven each), and Biochemistry, Neurological Surgery, Pharmacology, and Radiology (five each).

As announced over the summer, starting in FY24, awards from the Patient-Centered Outcomes Research Institute (PCORI) and the Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality (AHRQ) will be eligible for the SGI and CRGI programs. This expanded eligibility criteria will allow us to further recognize faculty pursuing clinical outcome research awards supported by federal funding to advance scientific discoveries that will ultimately benefit our patients.

### **SGI Program**

Began in FY20, the SGI provides an incentive of \$10,000 – either as personal compensation or as discretionary academic or laboratory development funds – to faculty who are awarded a second or third federally funded research grant. SGI eligibility criteria.

### **CRGI Program**

Launched in FY23, the CRGI awards between \$15,000 and \$40,000 in incentives to faculty who are overall PIs, co-PIs/MPIs, or project leaders of NIH program projects (P), cooperative research agreements (U), or collaborative program grants for multidisciplinary teams (RM). <a href="CRGI eligibility criteria">CRGI eligibility criteria</a> and payment tiers.
