



## **Apply for ARPA-H Federal Research Funding**

The <u>Advanced Research Projects Agency for Health (ARPA-H)</u> is a new federal research funding agency that supports bold and transformative biomedical and health science breakthroughs that cannot readily be accomplished through traditional research or commercial activity. The agency has a budget of \$1.5 billion of research funding that needs to be awarded in the next two years.

Currently, there are two ways for investigators to obtain ARPA-H funding:

- 1. Apply through the <u>Broad Agency Announcement</u> (BAA) by March 14.
- 2. Respond to one of the <u>posted research programs</u> already launched by ARPA-H.

The new federal agency has a customer experience hub in Dallas that will connect providers, researchers, performers, and patients locally, regionally, and across the country. Key ARPA-H Program Managers will have offices at Pegasus Park, and there is potential for us to establish direct working relationships.

ARPA-H has a robust online presence that includes <u>frequently asked questions</u>. If you would like to proceed with a proposal, please contact <u>Eric Peterson, M.D., M.P.H.</u>, or <u>Joan Conaway, Ph.D.</u>, who will provide information regarding the institutional coordination needed for this new type of agency award.



Four UT Southwestern faculty members have been <u>elected to the American Society for Clinical Investigation (ASCI)</u> – one of the oldest medical honor societies in the United States – in recognition of their outstanding scholarly activity.

### **New COI Statement of Financial Interest Software**

This month, the <u>Conflict of Interest (COI) Office</u> will be launching a new COI software solution called InfoEd. The platform will continue to make the COI Training Module and the COI Statement of Financial Interest available in one convenient location.

It provides improved functionality features such as a new dashboard to track the status of submissions and expanded automation in the outside activity review process, including automatic notifications of approvals. Moreover, interests reported in 2023 will pre-populate in the 2024 COI Statement.

The 2024 disclosure period will open in InfoEd on Jan. 22, at which time you will receive automated notifications with additional information on submitting. Contact the COI office with any questions.

#### Sim Center Forum Renamed to Honor Dr. Ginsburg

The UT Southwestern Simulation (Sim) Center will host its <u>Charles Morris Ginsburg Simulation-Based</u> Quality Improvement and Research Forum on May 8.

The event has been renamed to honor Charles Ginsburg, M.D., Vice Provost and Senior Associate Dean for Education, ahead of his retirement. Dr. Ginsburg's vision, dedication, and contributions paved the way for the creation of the Simulation Center.

"I'm not only proud of the Sim Center, I'm proud of UT Southwestern and the opportunities that we have here to advance new knowledge, educate people, and to be a resource for the community of Dallas," Dr. Ginsburg shared in a recent video recognizing the Sim Center's fifth anniversary.

Since opening in 2018, the center has facilitated more than 100,000 learner encounters spanning undergraduate, graduate, and continuing medical education, nursing, health professions, and research. That volume, and its breadth of training, has made it one of the largest and most advanced facilities of its kind in the nation.

### **New Online Master's Program in Nutrition Science**

UT Southwestern is expanding distance learning offerings with its <u>Master of Clinical Nutrition – Nutrition Science program</u> – its first fully online program.

Tailored for health care professionals and registered dieticians, this online, self-paced program is designed to enhance expertise for both inpatient and outpatient settings with advanced course curriculum spanning critical care nutrition, acute care nutrition, metabolism, nutrigenomics, and chronic care nutrition.



The Bureau of Labor Statistics projects a 7% growth in dietitian and nutritionist employment by 2032 – faster than the average for all occupations. Housed in the School of Health Professions, the Master of Clinical Nutrition – Nutrition Science program aims to address the escalating need for advanced nutritional education in health care.

Prospective students can apply to be a part of the fall 2024 cohort until April1.

### **Culinary Medicine Trainee Project Awards Program**

The Clinical and Translational Science Award (CTSA) Program is sponsoring culinary medicine scholarships for School of Health Professions' learners and medical students who participate in community-engaged nutrition education and community organization partnerships.

#### In Memoriam

#### Dr. Robert P. Foglia (1948-2023)



Robert P. Foglia, M.D., former Professor of Surgery and Pediatrics, passed away Dec. 10.

A graduate of Georgetown University School of Medicine, Dr. Foglia completed his surgical residency at UCLA and pursued subspecialty training in pediatric surgery at Children's Hospital National Medical Center. Over the span of four decades, he was faculty in top academic medical centers including UCLA, Harvard, Washington University, and UT Southwestern.

In 2006, Dr. Foglia joined our faculty and during his career at UT Southwestern acted as Chief of Pediatric Surgery and Surgeon-in-Chief at Children's Medical Center Dallas. He also served as Medical Director of

Trauma Services at Children's and Program Director of the Pediatric Surgical Training Program. Dr. Foglia retired in 2018 and held an adjunct professor position until February 2021. His legacy will be valued for many years to come.
